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The classic asymmetric pattern of academic cooperation for a Japanese or a French university





Pros


- A quick method for signing agreements
- Hundred and hundred MOU signed in each universities
- A large and diverse offer for the students and teachers/researchers
 - Cooperation conducted at a lab/department/faculty level

Cons

- No international strategy for the institution
 - Difficulties to maintain the collaboration
 - No reciprocity between the two partners
 - Lack of combined activities



The new proposed model of academic cooperation for a Japanese or a French university





A well balanced and sustainable privileged partnership

- An international strategy driven by the institution
 - Reciprocity and Interchange
 - Smart specialization of territories
- combination of academic research and student mobility
 - socio-economic development and cultural exchange

Implementation of concrete actions

- Supervised project in research unit
 - Setting up joint degrees
 - Off shore campuses



An inclusive alternative : the supervised project


- The project is carried out in a laboratory under the supervision of a lecturer, assistant professor or professor. The students will be examined by an oral presentation, a written report and a theory test.
- Students can validate 15 ECTS at Bachelor level or 20 ECTS at Master level during the semester.
- Students can complete their learning agreement with French or Japanese courses for foreign students (up to 8 ECTS) and with disciplinary courses




Building Joint Master degrees

- One academic coordinator per partner institution and a teaching committee
- A steering committee for examining cooperation results, reporting assessment and suggesting decisions required for any improvement
- A 4 terms program : 2 first terms in each partners, 3rd term alternatively in Japan and in France and final term in lab.
- A Master program associated with the PhD program
- A minimum standard in English that corresponds to the completed Level B2
- Partner institutions agree to find financial resources required to implement and sustain the partnership course
