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Purposes of the REF

Funding

To inform the selective allocation of funding for research

Accountability

To provide accountability for public investment in research and produce evidence of the benefits of this investment

Reputation

To provide benchmarking information and establish reputational yardsticks, for use within the HE sector and for public information

Impact

'an effect on, change or benefit to the economy, society, culture, public policy or services, health, the environment or quality of life, beyond academia'





Assessment criteria

Reach

the extent and/or diversity of the beneficiaries of the impact, as relevant to the nature of the impact

Significance

the degree to which the impact has enabled, enriched, influenced, informed or changed the performance, policies, practices, products, services, understanding, awareness or well-being of the beneficiaries



To be eligible, case studies must be:

...underpinned by...

- Research made a distinct and material contribution
- Can be indirect or non-linear

...excellent research...

- Research as a whole is at least equivalent to two star
- References and indicators to be included

...produced by the submitting unit in the last 20 years

 Staff carried out research within this disciplinary area, while working in the submitting institution



Impact case studies

- Max. 5 pages
- Underpinning research and references
- Details of impact
 - How did the research contribute?
 - Who were the beneficiaries?
 - What was the nature of the impact?
 - When did it occur?
- Corroborating sources
 - Reports, web links
 - Confidential reports
 - Testimonials





Supporting impact

- Strategies and approaches to supporting impact assessed via the environment template
- Assessed against criteria of 'vitality and sustainability'






REF 2014

England

- 6,975 case studies were submitted
- On average across all submissions, 44% of impacts were judged outstanding (4*) by over 250 external users of research, working jointly with the academic panel members. A further 40% were judged very considerable (3*).
